# WESTERN WALL WEARING AWAY? DISCOVERY OF EXTREME EROSION PROCESS COULD GUIDE NEW PRESERVATION TECHNIQUES

Visitors to the Western Wall in Jerusalem can see that some of its stones are extremely eroded. This is good news for people placing prayer notes in the wall's cracks and crevices, but presents a problem for engineers concerned about the structure's stability.

The Western Wall is a remnant of the ancient wall that surrounded the courtyard of the Jewish Temple in Jerusalem. It is located in Jerusalem's Old City at the foot of the Temple Mount.


To calculate the erosion in the different kinds of limestone that make up the Western Wall, researchers from the Hebrew University of Jerusalem used a laser scan to create an accurate three-dimensional computer model. The researchers are Dr. Simon Emmanuel, the Harry P. Kaufmann Senior Lecturer in Environmental Water Technology, and PhD student Mrs. Yael Levenson, at the Hebrew University's Institute of Earth Sciences.



As reported in an article accepted for publication in the journal Geology, they found that stones made up of relatively large crystals were resistant to wear, so that they were almost unchanged in the 2000 years since they were originally put in place. By contrast, limestone with very small crystals (about one thousandth of a millimeter in size) eroded far more quickly. According to Dr. Emmanuel,

"Understanding such weathering processes could help guide the development of effective preservation techniques. For example, it may be possible to develop materials that slow the rate of erosion by binding the tiny crystals in the rock together. Advanced engineering techniques like this should assist efforts to protect not only the Western Wall, but other cultural heritage sites in Israel and around the world".

The research appears as "Carbonate weathering rates accelerated by micronscale grain detachment," in the journal *Geology*. The research was supported by the Israel Science Foundation.

Invention seen as having huge commercial potential

Eating fruits and vegetables is good for you, but sometimes there's a price to the H


you, but sometimes there's a price to pay: illness caused by bacterial biofilms that adhere to the produce and to the packaging in which it's shipped.

Now a graduate student at the Hebrew University of Jerusalem has discovered

a way to attack those bacteria on food packaging. Using a novel packaging system to disrupt those bacteria, his invention has huge commercial potential.

The student, Michael Brandwein, is a recent immigrant to Israel from New York City. He is a researcher under the supervision of Prof. Doron Steinberg

from the Biofilm Research Laboratory of the Hebrew University's Dental Faculty. Brandwein's research has focused specifically on corrugated cardboard boxes, the worldwide medium for transporting the vast majority of fresh agricultural produce. The technology has now been successfully incorporated into industry-specific acrylic polymers, meant to coat the corrugated cardboard used in the fresh produce. The Hebrew University, through its technology transfer company, Yissum, holds granted patents on the process, and has signed an agreement with B.G. Tech of Kibbutz Beit Guvrin

There are 2 classes consisting of Bialik parents and teachers, particularly from the Early Learning Centre and also young couples where one partner is not born in the Jewish religion. ### OPENING OF CONFUCIUS INSTITUTE FURTHERS INTERNATIONALISATION AND RELATIONS WITH CHINA

The Vice Prime-Minister of The People's Republic of China, Mme. Liu Yandong, led a delegation of senior ministers and university presidents to the Hebrew University of Jerusalem recently, to participate in the Opening Ceremony of a new Confucius Institute

The Confucius Institute will promote the deepening of academic research into Chinese culture and history; serve the wider community through seminars on China's society, economy and government for Israeli government officials, civil servants and business executives; and enhance mutual understanding between Israel and China.

#### **Expanding Relations With China**

The Hebrew University currently has 17 agreements with academic bodies in China.

The number of Asian students at the Hebrew University has more than doubled in recent years. The recent increase is attributed to the availability of scholarships for Chinese students provided by Israel's Council for Higher Education (CHE) and by university supporters. Of particular note is the gift of Chinese business leader and Hebrew University Governor Zhao Hanqing, which offers scholarships for Chinese students for studies in areas such as agriculture, mathematics and computer sciences.

## An Active Player in the International Arena

The Hebrew University is an increasingly active player in the international arena, with 238 academic agreements with institutions in 43 countries; 78 competitive research grants from the European Research Council (ERC) since 2007, totaling over €120 million; student exchange agreements with 56 institutions in 24 countries; 90 courses for the study of some 30 languages; 177 postdoctoral researchers from 26 countries; and an annual enrolment of almost 2000 students from 80 countries at the Rothberg International School. In September 2012, the Hebrew University became one of the first institutions to join Coursera, which partners with leading universities to offer free online courses to people everywhere. The Hebrew University is currently ranked 70th in the world, and first in Israel, in the annual Academic Ranking of World Universities conducted by Shanghai Jiao Tong University in China.

### OCEAN ACIDIFICATION COULD LEAD TO COLLAPSE OF CORAL REEFS

#### Over 35 years, a 40% reduction in calcium carbonate deposits in Australia's Great Barrier Reef

An expedition from the Hebrew University of Jerusalem and the Carnegie Institute of Science has measured a roughly 40% reduction in the rate of calcium carbonate deposited in Australia's Great Barrier Reef in the last 35 years — a scenario that could damage the reef framework and endanger the entire coral ecosystem.

The ecological success of coral reefs depends on their calcium carbonate (CaCO3, limestone) structures that function as a huge filter to obtain plankton from the open ocean. Yet recent environmental changes including coastal nutrient pollution, alobal warming and ocean acidification caused by atmospheric CO2 increasingly threaten the existence of these unique ecosystems.

To better understand the effect of acidification on coral growth decline, Hebrew University scientists led by Prof. Jonathan Erez and Prof. Boaz Lazar at the Fredy and Nadine Herrmann

Institute of Earth Sciences, together with Carnegie Institute colleagues Dr. J. Silverman and Dr. K. Caldeira, carried out a community metabolism study in Lizard Island at the Great Barrier Reef in Australia.

According to Erez and Silverman, "The results of this study show a dramatic decrease in the calcification of the reef, and that it was likely caused by ocean acidification. When the rate of calcification becomes lower than the rate of dissolution and erosion, the entire coral ecosystem could collapse and eventually be reduced to piles of rubble. The collapse of this habitat would ultimately lead to the loss of its magnificent and highly diverse flora and fauna."



### WAS DA VINCI WRONG? FRICTION AND FRACTURE ARE INTERRELATED

Overturning conventional wisdom stretching all the way to Leonardo da Vinci, new Hebrew University of Jerusalem research shows that how things break (fracture) and how things slide (friction) are closely interrelated. The breakthrough study marks an important advance in understanding friction and fracture, with implications for describing the mechanics that drive earthquakes.

Over 500 years ago, da Vinci described how rough blocks slide over one another, providing the basis for our understanding of friction to this day. The phenomenon of fracture was always

#### Chief Rabbi's Delegation Visits the Hebrew University - Largest gathering of rabbis since the university's opening" learns about Hebrew University Tikkun Olam programs to heal the world

Chief Rabbi Ephraim Mirvis, the 11th Chief Rabbi of the United Hebrew Congregations of the Commonwealth, led a delegation of 50 rabbis on a visit to the Hebrew University of Jerusalem. The delegation heard presentations about Hebrew University Master's degree programs that exemplify Tikkun Olam — the Jewish value of sharing know-how and skills to help make the world a better place — in some of the most deprived and poorest societies. They also prayed in the campus's Hecht Synagogue

City of Jerusalem. Dr. Jonathan Mirvis, a Hebrew University senior lecturer and brother of Chief Rabbi Mirvis, remarked that not since the Hebrew University's opening ceremony in 1925 had so many rabbis congregated on its Mount Scopus campus. Dr. Mirvis lectures at the University's Melton Centre for Jewish

Education and the Glocal Community Development program. Welcoming the delegation, Hebrew University Rector Prof. Asher Cohen described the University's mission of combining the highest standards of academic excellence with community involvement for the benefit of Israel, the Jewish people, and the peoples of the world. Two examples of how this concept is being put into practice are the International Master's in Public Health (IMPH) at the Faculty of Medicine, and the Glocal Community Prof. Yehuda Neumark, Head of the Braun School of Public Health and Community Medicine and former Director of the IMPH program, described its worldwide impact over 40 years, and the remarkable achievements of its 800 graduates from 90 countries, working both in their home countries and with
